As usual there will be lots of activity in the Mart Room with the "It's for Free" and Silent Auctions. Speaking of auctions, our Chapter sponsored silent auction Friday night is slowly running out of donors. The auction is now open to members who wish to sell some items. There will be a 15% charge, going to Chapter 139, to sell your items. Please contact Joe Mixon if you have something to sell.

May One-Day

Chapter 139 had another good One Day Show at Grace Community Church on Saturday, May 17th with 39 members attending. Table rentals along with entry fees provided the Chapter with a slight profit for the day. There



were a number of good clocks including a Welch Patti and an English bell strike tall case that changed hands along with the usual many parts and pieces.

Darrah Artzner presented a great program "Determining Pocket Watch Quality". He covered many of the aspects involved in buying or evaluating a pocket



watch. Case condition (gold, silver or filled), movement condition (clean or rusty), hinges, bezels, dials (clean or cracked) and missing parts were covered. Darrah has posted a link to his presentation on the Chapter website. Twenty-nine of the 39 members registered stayed for the program.

There was no Board of Directors meeting.

Tech Sessions

Tech Sessions are held the second Saturday of each month and One-Day events are held quarterly. You'll see below that there is a time of sharing – show and tell – where objects are shared and questions are answered. You can also bring watches or clocks and our team of volunteers will help troubleshoot and repair. At each of these sessions, there is a wealth of horological knowledge available, all at no charge!!

April Tech Session

President Marcus Bush opened the mini session about 9:00 a.m. by introducing Edward McDowell to the attendees. Edward had just spent six weeks at the NAWCC school for horologists and gave members an enthusiastic description of the school and classes attended which were both clock and watch related. He stated that it was an expensive vacation but well worth it. This photo shows Edwards's impression of what this time felt like. He left photos of his experience at home but luckily Shaun Clarke, who had just spent a couple of weeks taking watch classes there, provided plenty to help out. Thanks to you both!

Ben Fulbright then took over the session and provided the Tech Day attendees an update on the Galveston Historical Foundation street clock located on the Strand in Galveston. The movement has been delivered to the GHF for installation. This movement restoration was done under the guise of Chapter 139 as a volunteer operation. Drew Lundgren provided the master unit for operation of the slave movement. Ben and Andy Staton provided the restoration



of the movement and advice for installation and final activation. There is a similar clock, though much newer, in Houston upon which the Chapter will be doing some restoration work. Stand by for updates on that matter.



Ben then followed that with a short presentation on Master Clocks, specifically IBM and International clocks. He stated that most of these types of clocks were utilized in schools. Clocks by most other makers will generally be just some variation on the workings. There were some sample movements and clocks passed around for handson examination. One was a sample of the clocks in question. There was also an example that utilizes a set of extra contact points from the side. There was also a specially adapted movement that had an electric clock motor to run it and a strange once-per-second contact point closure activation for some purpose another. Finally there was one clock for demonstration of the hinge question addressed above. By the way, Ben is the 'go to' guy for this sort of clock.

Ben provided several slave clock movements for anyone to take if they so desired. More of Ben's tips on this type of clocks can be found on the Chapter website.

May Tech Session

The May gathering was a full work session for clocks. However, Darrah Artzner also brought in a vault timer to show an alternative use for pocket watch movements. The only change was the replacement of the main spring barrel with an idler gear mated with an external barrel for a much larger main spring. The spring was partially wound so that consistent power was always available to the movement. This particular timer could be set for up to 72 hours, although Darrah said that he had seen others up to 115 hours in alarm boxes.

Pictured here is a Time Lock Co. of Cincinnati timer with an Illinois Watch movement. Illinois made movements especially for vault timer usage. The movements were only 15 jewel but had double rollers and were adjusted for time and temperature. More pictures are posted on the website.



June Tech Session

The session was abuzz with about 25 current members and one new member, Jerry Downs, present. Tim Glanzman began the session with an interesting "show and tell". It was a copy of a book cover by Stan Czubernat on Elgin Trench Watches. The author called Tim's company, Turn Key Coatings, regarding plating several watchcases to be used on the cover of this book.

Even though this isn't a clock related subject Tim warned everyone about a terrible computer virus called Ransom, which attacks data as well as programs. This virus can be removed fairly easy but unless you have current backup files you will have to pay the \$500 ransom in order to get your files released.

Ben Fulbright showed a restored black mantle clock belonging to the Bishop's Palace in Galveston. He suggested that the clock could possibly be delivered during a Chapter field trip, or by several members of the Chapter for a photo shoot.

Ben also asked if anyone could talk about mercury pendulums. The group all agreed that the mercury was a temperature compensating method and should be used in calculated amounts according to your pendulum length.

Ben also showed a Japanese 8-day gallery wall clock with a very heavy movement.

Ben introduced a gadget to see if anyone knew what it was used for. Darrah Artzner guessed that it was used to cut down leather watchbands, maybe, but thought it just might be a cutter that removes consistent widths



of any relatively soft

material. Nita Mixon then found a picture of it on the web and it stated that it was a cigar cutter. Hmmm......Multi use?

Marcus passed around a bezel for an Ollie Risinger banjo he was restoring for the All Texas Chapters Regional auction. The bezel needed more height to accommodate the works and the hands. Jim Birchfield, an excellent wood worker and Chapter member, volunteered to do this. He did an excellent job.

Darrah Artzner donated a hundred and eighty five pounds of clock books for the Silent Auction. He acquired them from a fellow Chapter 149 member up in Boston, MA that was trying to find them a good home. There were some great books in that pile!!
